

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

The Chairperson's Message



aulat Ram College is a premium college for women in Delhi University, founded by the individualistic educationist, Late Shri Daulat Ram Gupta in 1960. The institute, a large constituent college of University of Delhi, originally started as 'Pramila College' and was renamed as Daulat Ram College in 1964 as it grew into a full-fledged extended college of University of Delhi. It imparts education at the Bachelors level in Arts, Science and Commerce. It also enrolls students at the Masters Level and hold M.A. Tutorials. At present the College has 18 departments, over 3546 students on rolls, 185 teaching staff and 71 non-teaching staff. The courses in Science were introduced in 1968 which led to the construction of the Science Block and Science laboratories. The Commerce and M.A. courses as well as new Courses in B.A. (Hons.) and B.A. Programme were added simultaneously. Further expansion occurred with the introduction of B.Sc. (Hons.) in Bio-Chemistry, Chemistry and addition of Nutrition and Health Education (NHE), and Mathematics (Hons.).

Foreign language as an add-on Course in the college is open to the public. It offers Certificate/

Diploma/Advanced Diploma courses in French/ German/ Spanish/ Italian/ Chinese/ Japanese and Korean languages. The College building also houses a block of tutorial rooms, an imposing seminar hall, Computer laboratories with internet facilitates and a well-equipped library with over 90,000 titles. The college holds a leading position in sports and was developed as a training venue for the Commonwealth Games, 2010. It boasts of a State-de-arte multi-sports Academy and compendium of latest sports facilities. Cocurricular activities like Societies, Departmental Associations, the Women's Development Centre, Eco-Club, N.S.S and N.C.C. are available. For the old students to connect to their alma mater, the college has an active Alumni Association.

The college student's hostel has an intake capacity of nearly 204 students. The intensely cherished dream of the founder Shri Daulat Ram Gupta was finally given expression in 1990 by the then Chairperson late Shri Mahendra Nath Gupta (his son) who called upon Shri Rajiv Gandhi to lay the foundation stone of what stands today as an imposing multi -purpose auditorium in the frontage of the college. On the spur of the moment it was named 'Sadbhavana Bhawan'. From 1990 onwards, Shri Mahendra Nath Gupta relentlessly pursued its construction in 1997, the 'Sadbhavana Bhawan' was inaugurated to articulate the talent and the creative genius in Arts, Culture, Sports & Drama of the students and having a seating capacity of over 1400 persons.

The vibrant mix of the cocurricular and extracurricular activities both at the intracollege and inter college levels adds to the multidimensional character of the college. I feel privileged to be the Chairperson of such an institution and carrying forward the vision of its founder Daulat Ram Gupta, as his descendant.

The College is located in the north campus of University of Delhi. The College has been accredited with 'A' Grade by National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) in April 2017. The intake capacity for undergraduate program is approx. 1200 students in all the streams combined together. The college has a fully air conditioned hostel with first year intake of approx. 70 students. College runs its courses under Choice

Based Credit System and students have been offered one of the best combinations possible under generic electives, skill enhancement courses, and discipline specific elective courses which are detailed in following pages. It is a great pleasure as Principal to welcome you all to the beginning of your lifelong association with this College.

You are joining us at a time when higher education is undergoing rapid and dramatic transformation. We live in an era when knowledge is becoming more crucial in addressing the world's most pressing problems. We at Daulat Ram College have holistic approach between materialistic education (following text books) and education with substance. We aspire to empower all young women to succeed in their world by offering a wide variety of challenging, enjoyable and successful curricular, cocurricular and extra-curricular opportunities which is carried out through different clubs, societies, associations and student Union. In addition we set high expectations for our students with regard to their academic performance. In the year 2017-18, intake percentage in various courses were in the range of 91% to 97%. The College has this year admitted 198 students in its hostel and admission is strictly as per merit.

College has a rich set of extra-curricular activities to offer to its students. The Program like Miss DRC Talent Hunt, Manjari, Hostel Night, Sports Meet, societies like Annhad, Alahyaa, Zenith, Spectra, Sepia etc. provide platform where students can participate and showcase their talent. We have been organizing self-defence training camps and Yoga training camps for physical and mental well-being of students. This has been made possible through NSS, NCC,

WDC and sports departments of the college. The Equal Opportunity cell looks after the academic and extracurricular activities of the differently abled students. The College has a North East Cell which was established in 2014. The Cell has been active in sensitizing other students towards the culture and traditions of students belonging to North East. They have been working closely with local police and DCW for helping these students. Students are given opportunity to make campus clean and green through various initiatives taken by Eco club, NSS and NCC such as tree plantations and swachchata abhiyan. The other initiatives under which students can participate and contribute are converting garden waste to manure, Paper recycling etc.



The College Profile

Dallat Ram College, an 'A' Grade NAAC Accredited College, one of the leading colleges of University of Delhi, imparts education towards degree at the Bachelor's level in Arts, Science and Commerce. 

All-in-all, the College provides a holistic experience to its students, by working on their intellectual, emotional and spiritual development.



Reservations and Relaxations

The following reservations and relaxations are applicable for all programmes except B. Voc. Programmes.

Reservation of Seats for Schedule Caste (SC)/Tribe (ST) Applicants

- 22½% of the total numbers of seats is reserved for applicants belonging to Scheduled Caste Scheduled Tribes (15% for Scheduled Caste and 7½% for Scheduled Tribes, interchangeable, if necessary).
- Relaxation to the extent of 5% in the minimum marks shall be given to the applicants belonging to SC and ST to determine their eligibility and merit for admission to the programme concerned.
- In case, after giving 5% relaxation, the reserved seats still remain vacant, further relaxation would be given to the extent required in order to fill all the reserved seats. (AC Resolution A88, 14.6.1983) (EC Resolution 157, 24.12.2001). It is obligatory for all Colleges/Departments to fill all the seats reserved for SC/ST candidates. Eligibility in these cases is pass percentage.

Reservation of Seats for Other Backward Classes (Non-Creamy Layer, Central List)

- 27% seats will be reserved for the applicants belonging to Other Backward Classes (OBC) (non-creamy layer, central list).
- At the time of giving admission to an OBC applicant, the College will ensure that the caste is included in the Central List of OBC (the OBC status is to be determined on the basis of the Central (Govt. of India) List of OBCs notified by the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment on the recommendations of the National Commission for Backward Classes available at the website http://ncbc.nic.in/backward classes/index.html.)
- The certificate must mention non-creamy layer status of the applicant (Non-creamy layer status issued by an authority mentioned in DOPT Office Memorandum no. 36012/22/93-Estt. (SCT) dated 15.11.1993).
- The OBC applicants who belong to the 'Non-Creamy Layer' and whose caste appears in the Central List of the OBCs only, shall be eligible to be considered for admission under the OBC category (Validity period of OBC certificate in respect of 'creamy layer' status of the applicants as per DOPT Office Memorandum No. 36036/2/2013-Estt. (Res-I) dated 31 March 2016). The validity of the non-creamy layer certificate shall be for the financial year 2017-2018, issued after 31st March, 2018.
- If the applicant does not have the OBC non-creamy layer certificate of the latest financial year 2017-2018 at the time of registration, the applicant may upload the previously issued (older) OBC non-creamy layer certificate or the acknowledgement slip of OBC non-creamy layer certificate application. However, at the time of admission, the applicant must produce the recent financial year's (2017-18) OBC non-creamy layer certificate, issued by the same competent authority. This additional certificate must have reference of his/her already issued original caste certificate.
- The OBC applicants shall be given a relaxation of 10% in the minimum eligibility marks of the said programme and for the admission entrance test a relaxation of 10% of the minimum eligibility marks prescribed for General/UR Category applicants.
- If the seats meant for OBC remain vacant after arriving at the minimum eligibility, the same may be converted and filled up by other eligible applicants subject to approval from the University.

Note: The merit list for the unreserved category (UR) seats will comprise all the applicants in order of merit. No one will be excluded from the same. In other words, it will also include SC / ST / OBC applicants, if they meet the criterion of merit for UR category. The applicant cannot be excluded from the UR category merit list just because the applicant belongs to or has applied under SC/ST/OBC category. Such an applicant is entitled to be considered under the UR category, as well as under the reserved category. Admission to UR category seats will be strictly in order of the merit without excluding SC/ST/OBC applicants.

Reservation of Seats for Persons with Disabilities (PwD) (Supernumerary Seats)

As per the provisions of Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016, not less than five percent (5%) seats are reserved for Persons with Benchmark Disabilities. Person with benchmark disability means a person with not less than forty percent (40%) of a specified disability where specified disability has not been defined in measurable terms and includes a person with disability where specified disability has been defined in measurable terms, as certified by the certifying authority. It may be noted that the erstwhile Persons with Disability Act, 1995, under which reservation for Persons with Disabilities in admissions was provided earlier has now been repealed.

Reservation of Armed Forces (CW) (Supernumerary Seats)

- 1. All applicants seeking admission to various undergraduate programmes of the University of Delhi under this category will also have to register online as per schedule notified by the University.
- 2. Five percent (5%) of seats are reserved for applicants under CW categories, programme- wise in all colleges.

Reservation of Kashmiri Migrants (KM) (Supernumerary Seats)

- 1. All the Wards (sons/daughters) of Kashmiri Migrants who wish to be considered for admission to various undergraduate Programmes for University have to register online as per schedule notified by the University.
- 2. Up to 5% seats are reserved programme-wise in all colleges for the Wards of Kashmiri Migrants.
- 3. All the Wards of Kashmiri Migrants will have to upload a certificate of registration as Kashmiri Migrants issued by Divisional Commissioner/Relief Commissioner.
- 4. A concession of maximum 10% in the last cut-off marks fixed for unreserved category applicants shall be extended to the Kashmiri Migrants.
- 5. Admission of Wards of Kashmiri Migrants will be based on cut-offs to be announced by the Colleges.

Prime Minister's Special Scholarship Scheme for J&K students

The applicants selected under Prime Minister's special scholarship scheme for J&K students will be admitted directly to the Colleges.

- 1. Document verification and approval of admission in the College will be from 9:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.
- 2. After approval of admission, the applicant has to log on to the undergraduate admission portal to make online admission fee payment. This may be done till 12:00 noon of the next day of the last day of admission cut-of list (in which admission is sought).

Further Cut-offs/Spot Counselling schedule may be declared depending on the vacant seats.



Admission Process

- i. Applicants who have applied on university portal and meet the requisite cut-off should login to the UG admission portal through their registration account and select college/course where the applicant wishes to take admission.
- ii. A clear copy of online admission form containing the name of college (Daulat Ram College) with photograph should be printed on A4 size good quality paper. The candidate should bring photographs (2 copies) along with all relevant documents in original to college for verification of documents and other eligibility criterion.
- iii. The college will retain the certificates of approved applicant. The certificates will remain with the colleges during the admission process. However, the colleges shall promptly return the documents in case student withdraws/cancels the admission or student wishes to appear in counselling of any other university/institute for which a written application is to be given to S.O. (Admin).
- iv. After the college approves the admission on the UG admission portal, the applicant will then be required to log-on to the UG admission portal to make the online Admission Fee payment through one of the available online payment options. The approved applicant is permitted to make online admission fee payment till 12 noon of the next day of the given admission list deadline or as per deadline declared by the university from time to time.
- v. It may be noted that your admission in a college is completed only after payment of the online admission fee on the UG admission portal within the prescribed time-limit.
- vi. A applicant can take admission only in one course in one college at any given time. In case a student wishes to withdraw/cancel the admission in a course/college, the applicant should approach the college where the admission is taken. Only after the college cancels the admission of a applicant, the candidate can proceed to take admission in other courses/colleges. Admission fee will be transferred to other college where students takes admission with a deduction of Rs. 500/- in case of Indian National and Rs. 1000/- in case of foreign students as per university rules.
- vii. The college will not declare its cut off for a course in subsequent list if all its seats are full. There would be five cut off list in all as per university guidelines.
- viii. (a). The applicants who could not take admission in a given cut-off list can be considered for admission in the immediate next cut-off list only on the last date of admission, subject to availability of seats.
 - (b) For Boards, like International Baccalaureate and others, whose results are declared late, candidates may be considered in whichever cut-off list their results are declared, subject to availability of seats and provided the candidate had completed the online registration process.
- ix. Candidates desirous of taking admission in the college hostel should clearly indicate in admission form of college. Once college admission is complete, student should approach hostel for registration along with fee receipt of college. After getting their fee receipt they should register themselves in the hostel. The detailed procedure for hostel admission is listed in hostel information bulletin/handbook available in college/hostel.
 - In case of any ambiguity the information uploaded on University of Delhi's official website www.du.ac.in would be treated as final and binding on all.



Academic Subjects and Procedure for Calculating

I. Procedure for calculation of 'Best Four' subjects percentage for Honours Programmes (For admission to Arts/ Huanities Programmes):

- a. The merit shall be determined on the basis of one language and three best academic/elective subjects from LISTA.
- b. Out of three, academic/elective subject chosen above, one must be the concerned subject in which the admission is sought, failing which a deduction of 2.5% will be imposed on the calculated 'Best Four' percentage.

For honours in languages refer to point 4 of Basis of calculation of Best Four given below.

- *Note: i.* If an applicant doesn't include the subjects given in LIST A in 'Best Four', then a deduction of 2.5% of maximum marks will be levied for each subject for the purpose of calculating 'Best Four'.
 - ii. All subjects to be included in the calculation of 'Best Four'must have at least 70% theory component of exam. In case, the subject to be considered does not have 70% theory component and 30% practical component, then the marks of theory and practical only shall be converted to 70% and 30%, respectively on pro rata basis. These new marks will then be considered for calculation of "Best Four".

The following discipline subjects must be treated as Academic/ Elective subjects for the purpose of undergraduate admissions. All other subjects offered by different boards may be treated as non-elective.

Basis of calculation of Best Four

- 1. In case an applicant has studied elective and core languages, the core/elective language subject will be treated as language, while elective language can be considered as academic/music elective subject.
- 2. Admission to B.A. (Hons.) Social Work and B.A. (Hons.) Philosophy will be based on 'Best Four' percentage including one language and three academic/elective subjects as per the above procedure.
- 3. The applicants must have studied and passed Mathematics at the qualifying exam for admission to B.A. (Honours) in Economics.



- 4. (a) For admission to Honours in any language programme, advantage of 2% in the 'Best Four' percentage will be given to those applicants who have studied that particular elective language.
 - (b) In case, an applicant has not studied a language at qualifying exam and is seeking admission to Honours in that language (except for Honours in English and Hindi, refer (c)), deduction of 5% will be imposed on 'Best Four' percentage.
 - (c) For admission to Honours in English and Hindi, the applicant must have studied and passed the respective language in the qualifying exam and should include respective language for calculation of 'Best Four' percentage.
- 5. University may define any other relevant subjects as an academic/elective for a particular Honours programme.

II. Procedure for calculation of 'Best Four' subjects percentage for B. Com. (Honours)/B.Com.:

One Language from Part 1 of List C1 + three best subjects out of Part 2 of List C1.

OR

One Language from Part 1 of List C1 + any combination of subjects out of Part 2 of List C1, List C2 or any other subject (not listed either in List C1 or List C2). In such a case, the deduction of marks from aggregate percentage of 'Best Four' shall be as follows:

- i. For every subject included from List C2, a deduction of one percent in aggregate percentage of 'Best Four';
- ii. For every other subject (not listed either in List C1 or List C2), a deduction of 2.5% per subject in aggregate percentage of 'Best Four'.
- *Note:* 1. The applicant must have studied and passed Mathematics/Business Mathematics at the qualifying examination for admission to B. C.om. (Hons.).
 - 2. The computation of 'best four' subjects in the above framework should lead to an effective and unique 'best four' which would be higher than any other combination of 'best four' subjects.

II. Procedure for calculation of 'Best Four' subjects percentage for B.A. programme:

- a. One Language (Core/Elective/Functional)
- b. Any three elective subjects can be chosen. A deduction of upto 5% on 'Best Four 'percentage may be imposed if there is a change of stream for admission to B.A. programme, which means either from Commerce stream to or Science stream to Arts/Humanities/Social Sciences.
- c. One non-listed from (LIST A) subject can be included in calculation of 'Best Four' without any deduction.
- d. For admission to B.A. (Vocational) only, related vocational subjects may be treated at par with academic/elective subjects and upto two vocational subjects, which are in relationship with the programme of study may be included for the calculation of 'Best Four'.
- e. If an applicant opts for Modern Indian Language (MIL) (Except Hindi) as a subject, an advantage of up to 10% may be given in 'Best Four' in those colleges where MIL is offered as a subject.
- *Note:* i. The college will have to notify the actual deduction upto 5% for change of stream before hand by uploading on their website and intimating the same to the University.
 - ii. If more than one non-listed subject is included for calculation of 'Best Four', a deduction of 2.5% each in 'Best Four' may be levied in addition to deduction due to change of stream, if any.

Admission to Science Programmes

The Basis of Selection for Mathematical Sciences/Science/Interdisciplinary & Applied Sciences programmes is listed in the table on the next page. All the subjects to be included for Basis of Selection (PCM/PCB/PCMB) must have at least 70% theory component of examination. In case, the subject to be considered does not have 70% theory component and 30% practical component, then the marks of theory and practical only must be converted to 70% and 30%, respectively on pro rata basis. These new marks will then be considered for calculation of PCM/PCB etc. (Refer to the Table on the Next Page)

Rules And Procedure For Admission

For Admission to the First Year of the Bachelors Degree Course

- 1. Pre-registration is a must for getting admission.
- 2. An applicant must have passed Senior School Certificate (10+2) or the Indian School Certificate (12 years) or an Examination recognized as equivalent by University of Delhi.
- 3. There is no minimum age bar for admission to undergraduate courses.
- 4. Gap year(s) would be no bar for purpose of admission to the undergraduate courses.
- 5. The cut off percentage for admission to each course will be put up on the university website and college notice board/website on dates as per schedule notified by the Delhi University. No individual intimation regarding admission will be sent.
- 6. After declaration of the Cut-off lists, eligible applicants should present themselves in person for admission. The applicant should bring the following original documents:
 - a. Certificate and marksheet of class X.
 - b. Marksheet of class XII
 - c. Character Certificate and Provisional Certificate from the institution last attended.
 - d. Transfer and migration certificate. (For outstation candidates).
 - e. 3 unattested recent passport size photograph.
 - f. Two sets of attested photocopies of the above certificates.

The University will accept self-attested copies of documents / papers provided by the students. It is made clear that if any false attestation / falsified records are detected, the student will be debarred from attending any course in the University/or its Colleges for next five years and in addition, a criminal case under relevant sections of IPC (viz.470,471,474 etc.) will be instituted against him/her. Scheduled Caste (SC) / Scheduled Tribe (ST) / Other Backward Classes (OBC) applicants should attach a Certificate to the effect in their own name. SC/ST/OBC will be subjected to the verification of caste certificate by appropriate authority. If the certificate is found fake, the admission will be cancelled. The differently-abled applicants should attach the latest certificate of disability not exceeding six months prior to the date of admission. 5% seats in all under graduate and post graduate will be reserved for candidates having minimum 40% physical disabilities.

- 7. Documents to be submitted on Orientation Day (i.e. 19th of July 2018)
 - a) As per the requirements of Ordinance XV-B, it is mandatory for every student to submit an anti ragging affidavit on notarized Page no. xxxxx non-judicial stamp paper of Rs. 50/-.
 - b) Two undertaking forms each duly signed by the student and parent should be submitted to the Teacher-In-charge of the concerned department.
- 8. Admission to all courses are routed through various committees constituted for the purpose. Applicants are requested not to approach the Principal in connection with admissions.

- 9. No student who qualifies on the basis of the percentage indicated in the cut-off list shall be denied admission provided she pays the fees by the stipulated date and time and has applied online on University portal.
- 10. Every student shall be required to sign a declaration to submit herself to the disciplinary jurisdiction of the Principal, Vice-Chancellor and other authorities in accordance with the Statutes and Ordinances of University of Delhi.
- 11. All admissions are subject to the approval of University of Delhi.

For Admission to M.A. Part-I

- 1. An applicant must have passed the Bachelors Degree Examination (10+2+3).
- 2. There is no minimum age bar for admission to postgraduate courses in the University and its Colleges.
- 3. For admission to M.A., students must apply directly to the appropriate Faculty in the University of Delhi for registration. No decision regarding admission to the College will be taken prior to the preliminary selection. The candidates selected by respective faculties would become eligible for admission in the college.

Foreign Students

Admission of foreign students is dealt with by the Deputy Dean (Foreign Students), Conference Centre, University of Delhi, Delhi - 110007. Email: fsr du@yahoo.com. No foreign student is admitted directly by the college without a letter from the Foreign Student's Advisor, University of Delhi, regarding her eligibility and clearance for her holding student's visa. As per University rules, an amount of Indian Rupees equivalent to US\$ 100 per year will be paid by every foreign student to the college along with fee.



Admission on the basis of Excellence in Extra-Curricular Activities

Admission to various courses in the academic year 2018-19 on the basis of extra-curricular activity (ECA) will be strictly as per University of Delhi guidelines. Under these guidelines ECA committee has been constituted which will be admitting students under extracurricular activity quota. The Complete schedule for the trials (preliminary and final) will be notified on the Delhi University website. The final list of selected applicants containing marks awarded for the ECA certificates and trials shall be displayed on the University Website.

List of Original Certificates to be presented at the time of admission

- 1) Documents in support of achievements in ECA, on the basis of which admission is sought (for last 3 years only i.e. 1st April 2015 to 31st March 2018).
- 2) A letter of recommendation from the head/principal/officiating authority of the institution last attended, giving details of the activities in which the candidate has participated. This letter is not mandatory but desirable.
- 3) Mark sheet of class XII on the basis of which the admission is sought.
- 4) Provisional/ pass certificate of last exam passed.
- 5) Conduct / character certificate from the institution last attended.
- 6) School Examination certificate (class X certificate), stating date of birth.
- 7) Transfer and Migration certificate, for outstation candidates.
- 8) Caste certificate [reserved categories SC/ ST/ OBC (non-creamy layer)]

Following are the activities on the basis of which a candidate can seek admission under the ECA category:

- 1) Dramatics (English/Hindi)
- 3) Music (Vocal/Instrumental)
- 5) Dance (Classical/Western)

- 2) Fine Arts
- 4) Debating (English/Hindi)
- 6) Creative writing (English/ Hindi)

Note: The college reserves the right not to make admissions under the category if no candidate is found suitable. The decision of the college ECA admission committee shall be final and binding. No queries towards the same will be entertained. The selected candidates shall submit an Undertaking at the time of admission stating that the candidate will perform for the College and University for the entire period of the candidate's undergraduate programme of study.

Marking for Individual, Dual & Combat Sports shall be done by One Expert and marking for Team Games shall be done separately by Three Experts of the Sports Admission Committee.

Note:

- 1. The allotment of Programme to the eligible applicant shall conform to University regulations and will be the sole responsibility of the College and may be finalized by the Sports Admission Committee of the College which will include:
 - a. Chairperson: Principal
 - b. Convener: Teacher in-charge, Department of Physical Education
 - c. Member/s: Teacher/s, Department of Physical Education
 - d. Nominee: One faculty member of the Staff Council
- 2. The Sports Admission Committee of the College shall:
 - a. Screen the application form uploaded by the applicant
 - b. Verify original Merit/Participation Sports Certificate of the applicant as per marks allotted by DUSC
- 3. In Case of Tie: Applicants securing same marks in the same Game/ Sport eligible to take admission in the same Programme in the college, it may be resolved by the Sports Admission Committee of the College.
 - (a) Applicant securing higher marks in Sports Trials will be placed/given higher preference.
 - (b) If the Tie still persists, all the applicants may be admitted.



- 4. The grievance related to allocation of marks for Merit/Participation Sports Certificate and Sports Trial shall be redressed by the UG Sports Grievance Committee of the DUSC.
- 5. The list of finally selected applicants containing marks of the Sports Certificates and Sports Trials along with Programmes allotted shall be displayed on the Website and Notice Board of the College for three days, to take cognizance of the grievances, if any. The Grievance Committee of the College must resolve all the grievances within next three working days before admitting the applicants.
- 6. The list (soft and hard copy) of finally admitted applicant on the basis of Sports shall be sent to DUSC within seven days from the last date of admission of the University by the constituent Colleges.
- 7. The College shall maintain a proper record of the applicants admitted on the basis of Sports.
- 8. The applicant as per their age must be eligible to participate in Inter-University Competitions for the next three years and should not be employed on Part-time / Full-time basis anywhere.
- 9. Any injury/ casualty caused to the applicant during Sports Trials shall be the sole responsibility of the applicant.
- 10. It is mandatory to submit an Undertaking on Non-Judicial Stamp Paper of Rs. 100/- by the applicant at the time of admission stating that he/she will play for the College and University during their Under-Graduate Programmes of study.

Note: If none of the candidate is found suitable for any particular game then the College has the right to transfer the seat allotted for the game to any other game.

^{*} Caution Money is Refundable if claimed before the end of Financial Year in which the student leaves the college. Caution Money will be refunded through RTGS/NEFT. Student should have her own account in any bank.

Financial Assistance To Students

- 1. Partial or full fee concession may be granted to economically weak students. Application for fee concession must be submitted on the prescribed Form obtainable from the Accounts Section, duly supported by income certificate attested by the Magistrate/Civil Officer/Employer. The application complete in all respects must be submitted to the Accounts section, latest by end of August in the year.
- 2. Fee concession granted is subject to good conduct, regular attendance and satisfactory progress in studies and may be withdrawn any time if a student is found neglecting any of these.
- 3. Students belonging to Scheduled Castes/ Scheduled Tribes are awarded Post- Matric Scholarships by the Directorate of Education, Delhi Administration. Forms will be available in the College Office. These should be filled, accompanied by necessary certificates/documents.
- 4. All forms will be available from the College office free of charge. In addition to the above concessions, ad-hoc grants may be given from "Student Aid Fund". **Students desiring to avail this aid must contact the Convener of Students' Amenities Committee.**
- 5. Notices of scholarships granted by Delhi Administration, University of Delhi or other agencies are displayed on the College Notice Board from time to time as and when they are received.
- 6. Eligible SC/ST, OBC, PWD Students etc should submit their scholarship form for the academic year by February for processing scholarship to SC/ST, OBC, PWD etc each year.
- 7. Students should take financial assistance from one source only and for that they have to submit the application to SO.

Note: The Students' Amenities Committee is in charge of students' amenities. Students are welcome to seek the Committee's assistance.



Academic Requirements

The students of the College are governed by the rules and regulations of the University of Delhi as laid down in Ordinance VII of the University Calendar. The students are required to attend all lectures, tutorials/ preceptorials and practicals regularly. As per University rules a student is required to attend not less than two thirds of total lectures and practicals, separately, held in the college in each academic year/semester (67% in each year/semester). Students not fulfilling the attendance requirement may be debarred from appearing in the University examination.

Students selected/deputed to participate in annual NCC camp or NSS assignments or inter-college/national/international sports or extra-curricular activities approved by the Principal may be condoned up to a maximum of one third lectures and practicals held.

In case of illness the leave application must be accompanied by a medical certificate and fitness certificate which should be submitted to the college office after getting the signature of the teachers concerned.

Please note that shortage of attendance will not be condoned for attending other courses of study outside the college.

University Examination and Promotions

1. The University examination schedule and rules of promotions as prescribed by the University of Delhi will be applicable.

Internal Assessment Scheme

As per decision of University of Delhi 25% of the total marks in each paper will be allotted for the internal assessment as per Ordinance-VIII-E of the University Calender.

Guidelines for Under-Graduate Courses in CBCS Semester Mode Internal Assessment

Internal Assessment shall carry 25% weightage and End Semester Examination 75% weightage the distribution of Internal Assessment marks shall be as follows:

At the end of the semester, the attendance of every student in each paper in lectures and tutorials be summed up, converted into percentage, and marks awarded for Internal Assessment by the teacher.

With the introduction of Internal Assessment, the maximum marks for the University Examination in each paper shall stand reduced accordingly. For Example:

for a 100 marks paper, the University shall be of 75 marks.

for a 75 marks paper, the University Examination shall be of 55 marks.

for a 50 marks paper, the University Examination shall be of 38 marks.

for 53 marks paper, the University Examination shall be of 25 marks.

In the case of a student who is selected as a member of the N.C.C. to participate in the annual N.C.C. Camps or is deputed to undertake Civil Defence work and allied duties, or in the case of a student who is enrolled in the National Service Scheme and is deputed to various public assignment by or with the approval of the Head of the institution concerned, or a student who is selected to participate in sports or other activities organized by the Inter-University Board or is selected to participated in sports or other activities organized by the Vice-Chancellor, or a student who is required to represent the University at the Inter University Youth Festival, or a student who is required to participate in periodical training in the Territorial Army, or a student who is deputed by the College to take part Inter-College sports, fixtures, debates seminars, symposia a social work projects, or a student who is required to represent the College concerned in debates and other extra-curricular activities held in other Universities or such other activities approved by the Vice-Chancellor, the following provision will apply:

- (i) A student in the categories listed above, will have to fulfill the requirement of written assignments and projects/term papers/seminars/field-work with the flexibility, however that she may, if necessary, be allowed additional time for submission of written assignments.
- (ii) A student in the categories listed above, will get the benefit or attendance for internal Assessment for the classess missed as per the existing provisions of Ordinance VII.2 (9) (a) (i).
- (i) The University reserves the right to review, and if necessary moderate the marks in any paper/papers in any College/Department.

Medical certificates shall be excluded while calculating credit towards marks to be awarded for regularity, though such certificates shall continue to be taken into account for the purpose of calculating eligibility to appear for examinations as per the existing provisions of Ordinance VII.2.9.(a)(ii).



Payment of Fee

All fee receipts should be preserved for scrutiny and should be produced at the time of filling up the examination forms and refund of caution money. Notice regarding payment of College/Examination fee will be put up on the notice board.

Identity Card

Every student is issued an identity card by the College. **It is mandatory for the students to carry them every day. In case of any kind of indiscipline, the I-card will be confiscated.** In case of loss of I-card the students are advised to intimate the college office immediately. Duplicate I-card will be issued on payment of Rs. 100/- Any change of address or phone no. should also be notified by the student.

Discipline

Students will be governed as per Ordinance XV-B of the University Calendar.





Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) GUIDELINES

- 1. One credit is equivalent to one hour of teaching(Lecture/tutorial) or two are of practical of field work per week. The duration of classes may be decided according by the principals of colleges.
- 2. The number of papers under core course, elective course and ability enhancement courses and their respective credits for different undergraduate programmes is as per UGC's guidelines.
- 3. The examination scheme as approved by the Academic Council and Executive Council for the undergraduate courses under CBCS by amending Ordinances VIII(2) and ordinance IX.
- 4. As per standard, the size of the tutorials is 10-15 students. The Principals of the respective Colleges may decide about the class size and tutorial size as per their requirement according to prescribed standards.
- 5. The gender elective courses offered by the departments will be taught by teachers of the same departments.
- 6. The Principals of the colleges may take decision for offering more than one general elective papers to be opted by the students in each semester.
- 7. A student admitted in a particular department can opt for general elective courses offered by the other department, for example, a student admitted under B.A. (Hons.) History programme cannot opt for general elective courses offered by the department of history.
- 8. The general elective papers as prepared by departments and approved by the academic council and executive council of the university of Delhi can be offered in the academic year 2018-19.
- 9. The core papers of English/Hindi/MIL as part of two languages required to be studied is different from the courses of English/Hindi/MIL under Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC).
- 10. The student of B.Sc. (Hons.) Botany and B.Sc. (Hons.) Zoology must opt one or two General Elective papers offered by Department of chemistry so that their eligibility for admission in various Institutions is not hampered.
- 11. Similarly, students admitted under B.Sc. Programme and willing to pursue post -graduation in Physics/Chemistry/Electronics must opt a paper of Mathematics as General Elective, if Mathematics is not one of the core discipline being studied.
- 12. The student of B.Sc. (Hons.)/B.A. (Hons.)/B.Com. (Hons.) in order to be eligible for post-graduate in another discipline may opt for the General Elective of a particular subject in each semester to earn 24 credits in the concerned discipline.



Facilities Provided

Library and Reading Room

Library and Reading Room facilities are open only to students and staff of the college. The College Library possesses an excellent collection of more than 1,20,000 books, journals/ periodicals. The Library is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday to Friday. On Saturday, library is open for students but books issue and return facility is not provided. For the purpose of issuing, books are categorized into three sections: General Section, Reserved Section and Reference Section. The Library is completely digitalized with latest softwares. Library boasts of a separate Braille Section with softwares such as (Angel: Talking Digital Pocket Daisy Player, E-Book Reader, MP3 Player, Radio cum voice Recorder) for the benefit of differently-abled students, especially VH.

Terms and Conditions for Issuing of Books

- 1. Before leaving the counter, the member should check whether the book lent to her is in sound condition, if not, she should immediately bring the matter to the notice of the Librarian otherwise she is liable to be held responsible for any loss/damage and would be required to replace it with a sound/fresh copy.
- 2. Periodicals, directories, encyclopedias, which might be difficult to replace and other such works as may be declared reference books by the Librarian shall not be lent out.
- 3. Members are not allowed to sub-lend the books of the library.
- 4. Students who return books later than the due date will be liable to pay a fine as decided by the College authorities from time to time.
- 5. At present the fine for general section books is `1 per day for first fifteen days of delay. Thereafter, it will be `5 per day for one month, after which the fine will be `10 per day. Fine for Reserved Section books is `2 per day for first week and thereafter it is `10 per day.
- 6. Any infringement of the rules will deprive the member of the privilege of admission to and of borrowing books from the Library.
- 7. Each student of M.A. course is entitled to borrow six books at a time.
- 8. The Library membership will be valid till the student leaves the college.
- 9. Timings for Issue and Return of Books:
 - i. Books from General Section are issued and returned from 9.00 a.m. to 4.00 p.m.
 - ii. Timings for issue of books from Reserved Section are from 12.30 p.m. to 4.00 p.m.
 - iii. Books from Reference Section are only issued for consultation in the Library against Reference Card from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.



Teachers Study Room

The college has a well-maintained teachers study room adjacent to library which is equipped with computer facility and lockers. The study area is WiFi enabled, promoting easy access to research and study material.

Laboratories

The College has well equipped and well managed laboratories for all the Science Courses offered, viz. Bio-Chemistry, Botany, Chemistry, Physics and Zoology. The Departments of Nutrition & Health Education, Maths and Psychology also have separate well equipped labs.

Computer Lab

The College has well equipped Computer Labs with Pentium machines powered by the latest configuration. The Labs have connectivity with the Delhi University intranet with access to the internet. The main computer lab has 38 computers and there is an additional computer lab for Commerce and Mathmatics students which has 25 computers with internet facility. The Commerce computer lab and Maths computer lab has 40 computer terminals each. The Maths computer lab has licensed UBUNTU version 8.1 and licensed SPSS for students and faculty.

College Auditorium-Sadbhavna Bhawan

The college auditorium, Sadbhavna Bhawan is a proscenium hall with a large stage and a seating capacity of over 1,400, ideally suited for theatre activities and dramatics with plays having large cast. All major intra-college and inter-college events also take place in the auditorium.

Conference Hall

The Conference Hall has a capacity of 200. Since its inception in October 2016 it has been venue of a large number of academic workshops, seminars and conferences. The hall is fully air-conditioned, Wi-Fi enabled with digital projection and best audio facility. The college host inter-college, intracollege and departmental activities in this hall. It has been a big asset for the college.

Seminar Hall

The Seminar Hall of the college is the place for multifarious activities throughout the year. The activities in the seminar room range from curricular and co-curricular seminars, lectures, debates, discussions and workshops to Student Union functions, NSS and Women Development Centre activities. It serves as a perfect venue for hosting departmental farewell and freshers' programs. It is air conditioned, with a seating capacity of 200 people. Its wooden panels allow space division making the large area convenient to be used for simultaneous multipurpose activities.



Amphitheatre

The open-air amphitheatre, namely Rangshala, offers a stage to the young students to hone their talent, communication and performing skills. It has been witness to many famous events and has provided a forum to many burgeoning artists. It is the perfect spot for nukkad natak, societies' practice, dance performances. It has been a venue for hoisting national flag during Republic Day and Independence Day celebrations.

Medical Room

Medical room with an attendant nurse and first aid facilities is available from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The students can also avail of the World University Health Service of the University of Delhi against the nominal annual fee of ₹ 5.

College Canteen

The College canteen offers a varied menu at subsidized rates. The College Canteen provides healthy and nutritious food for students. A range of cuisines are freshly and hygienically prepared and made available for breakfast and lunch. Apart from cooked choices, students can buy branded packed snacks too.

Nescafe Corner


Located admist the bank and canteen, the Nescafe corner serves as a serene space for out-of-theclassrooms brainstorming sessions. The kiosk provides a range of hot and cold beverages and accompaniments. The outdoor benches and circular tables add to the charm of the place.

Bank

The College has banking facilities on its premises. The University Branch of Indian Overseas Bank operates in the College. It also has an ATM facility for students.

Placement Cell

The Placement Cell in its urge to provide one of the best Placement and Internship opportunities to students and alumni organizes soft skills, CV writing sessions and group discussions to prepare students in their placement pursuit. It has conducted various recruitment drives throughout the year in which companies such as Ernst & Young GDS, KPMG India, Global Arcus, Indigo Airlines, Genpact, S&P Global, Bharti AXA and many more had come for recruitment. In 2017-18, more than 60 students have been successfully placed in various reputed organizations with a CTC ranging from Rs. 3.5 to 5.5 lakhs.





Besides the above, it also collaborated with many other companies such as Hindustan Times, Wipro, FIS Global, PWC for plethora of job profiles like event management trainee, research associate, business associate, actuarial role, risk consulting, academic developer, content writer, articleship, etc. The placement cell also took the initiative of sharing various job opportunities with our alumni such as of FIS Global, Edumentor, XL Dynamics, Hilti India, Genpact and EY India.

The Placement cell also organized Internship and Career fair- 'INCREMENTUM' where several companies, international universities and other higher educational institutions marked their presence. The footfall of students was around 600-700 from various courses and colleges. Companies such as IDBI Federal Insurance, Umeed NGO, Outlook and many others hired interns for various profiles like Human Resources, Project Management, Content Development, Photography, Marketing and Social Work.

Psychology Resource Centre

The Psychology Resource Centre (PRC) addresses the psycho-social needs of the students, teachers and non-teaching staff, that is, to be aware of and effectively manage with everyday life issues and stressors which include self-growth and development, handling stress and emotions, relationship issues, academic pressures, constant worry and anxiety. With changing times, human life has become increasingly stressful making it imperative for people to be aware and develop a psychological understanding of themselves and their surroundings. This is achieved by PRC provides counseling services, Faculty Development Programs, functions and events that address the mental health and wellbeing of all stakeholders. PRC includes: Mental Health Center, Value Education Center, Positive Psychology Centre and Capacity Building Centre.

Drosophila Resource Center

Drosophila Resource Centres had been set up in 2011 in the Department of Biochemistry by Dr. Sunita Joshi and the Department of Zoology by Dr. Chitra Bhasin under aegis of Star College Project, Department of Biotechnology, Govt. of India. These centres were set up with the objective of serving as training and resource centres using *Drosophila melanogaster* (Banana fruit fly) model system in studying Genetics, Evolutionary Biology, Developmental Biology and Cell Biology. Regular hands on training programs and workshops are conducted to provide training to Faculty and students from departments of Biochemistry, Botany, life Science and Zoology of Delhi University Colleges. *Drosophila* wild and mutant stocks are maintained and provided to many colleges of Delhi University to conduct lab experiments in Genetics, Developmental Biology and Cell Biology. A lab manual on 'Rediscovering Genetics' authored by Dr. Sunita Joshi and Dr. Neeru Dhamija was published in 2016 that covered the range of experiments performed in Genetics using *Drosophila* model system.



Zebrafish Lab Facility

The zebrafish lab facility was set up in October 2015, jointly by Biochemistry department and Zoology department in collaboration with CSIR-IGIB, Mathura Road, Delhi, and Sansriti Foundation Delhi. The facility is funded by Star Innovation projects DU, Star College project DBT, Govt. of India, and Innovation projects DU. It was developed with the aim of providing an alternative in vivo non –invasive model system for science education, teaching and research. The facility provides training in zebrafish model system to faculty and students. Till date ~ 50 faculty members and ~500 students from various science streams from different Delhi University Colleges have participated in various workshops conducted by the zebrafish lab facility.

The state of the art temperature and photo-period controlled facility houses automated re-circulatory fish habitat system, RO water plant, stereo-microscopes, inverted microscope with digital display screen (Evos) and fluorescent microscope (Nikon). The facility have been hosting summer internship program for students (under-graduate and post graduate) to get hands on training and research experience. Zebrafish lab facility also serves as a resource center to provide zebrafish and embryos to other colleges/departments and research institutes to support teaching and lab practicals.

RO Water

Cold and purified drinking water is supplied to the students through the RO system. Upgraded from bulky water coolers, the water is dispensed through seamless junction of taps located in a clean area dedicated for this purpose. Located on ground and first floors, the area is beautifully lit up by posters signifying the importance of water conservation.

Wi-Fi Connectivity

The College is fully Wi-Fi enabled. Keeping in mind the advanced technological demands of the students, the college provides this facility to all the students by sharing a secure password to be used within the college premises.

CCTV Surveillance

Closed-Circuit Television Units, 50 approx. in number, are strategically installed in the college and hostel premises to ensure that proper discipline is maintained. It is also useful for safety concerns of students.

Hostel

Daulat Ram College Hostel established in 1974, is the accommodation facility exclusively meant for undergraduate students of the College. The hostel is equipped with various modern facilities and amenities, viz., air-conditioned rooms, laundry, free Wi-fi, computer room, medical room etc. to ensure



a comfortable and happy stay for the resident students. The hostel has pleasing ambience with well laid out lawns and gardens which help in providing a peaceful and conducive atmosphere for studies. It has been winning acclaim and awards for the best maintained environment in Delhi University. The hostel also has its own kitchen garden. Active participation of resident students in all co-curricular, extracurricular and cultural events of college and hostel help in their holistic development. It is proud of its successful and illustrious alumnae for whom it was always a 'home away from home'. Admission to the hostel is strictly on the basis of merit. All admission related information is displayed on the college/hostel notice board and college website from time to time.

Green Ride: (Last Mile Connectivity)

Introduced in 2017, it is a public bicycle sharing system which is one of the unique features of DRC. Promoting healthier lifestyle and everyday practices, this is an initiative which is environmental friendly. Students can hire bicycles for rides within the university campus. Once the ride is complete, the bicycles can be deposited at any of the five such centres located in North Campus. Please contact the centre for more details.

Sports Complex and Gymnasium

The college has a state-of-the-art gym complete with latest fitness equipment and machinery including treadmills, cross-body trainer, exercising bike, weight trainer etc. Promoting a healthy and active lifestyle, it caters to the students and staff who wish to avail the facility.

Recycling Unit

College aims to become zero discharge campus. Thus it has set up a recycling unit on campus which houses a paper recycling machines and leave shredder machine. This machines help to make recycled paper and leave shredder machine helps to make manure. The recycling unit is very popular in campus and manufactures tons of manure which is used in house or sold outside. The sale produce is used to meet expenses of recycling unit. The unit also prepares ceramic pots with medicinal/antipollution plants. These pots are used as mementos for various college functions. The recycling unit also recycles college waste paper to make white and brown recycled papers which are given to the arts society for painting and to department association for their used. Ceramic pots and paintings are being used as gifts for our guests in the college. Students do their internship here. The NSS students earn NSS hours by participating in green initiatives.





SEPIA-Film and Photography Society




Gandhi Study Circle



Departmental Profile

DEPARTMENT OF BIOCHEMISTRY

The Department of Biochemistry, a Star Status Department, awarded by Department of Biotechnology, GoI, was started in the year 1988 and offers a BSc (Hons) course which is unique to only a few colleges in India. This course covers areas in basic Biochemistry such as biomolecules, proteins, enzymology and intermediary metabolism, as well as advanced areas in Biology such as cell biology, physiology, hormone biochemistry, nutritional biochemistry, biochemistry of diseases, immunology, molecular biology, genetics and recombinant DNA technology. The department has well equipped laboratories wherein all modern biology experiments can be conducted. In addition a Drosophila Resource Centre, Zebrafish lab facility and Recycling unit for waste management has been established, where students can undertake short term training, and research internships. The department has been awarded projects from the Department of Science and Technology, Star College Project, Department of Biotechnology, GoI., DU Innovation Projects, Star Innovation projects and DRDO. The department has the distinction of having over 90% first classes as well as University positions every year. Graduates from the department have been selected for integrated Ph.D and MSc programmes in Biochemistry, Biotechnology, Molecular Biology, Neurosciences etc., in leading scientific Institutions such as IISC (Bengaluru), TIFR-NCBS, ISER (Pune), JNU, UDSC in India, as well as Cambridge, Universities in the US and Max Planc. Institutes in Germany. The department is proud of its alumni who are at faculty/ scientific positions at prestigious US universities, JNU, DRDO, Delhi University Biochemistry Department, and many undergraduate Colleges.

After graduation, student can get enrolled in PG courses such as M.Sc. in Inorganic, Organic, Physical, Analytical, Polymer Science, Forensic Science, Material Science, Biotechnology, Nanotechnology etc, MBA, MCA and B.ed. A qualification in chemistry opens doors to a wide range of careers that includes teaching, industry (both chemical and pharmaceutical) and research. The department has highly qualified, dedicated and experienced faculty. Department has well equipped laboratories for regular practical classes as well as research activities. Department is running DBT project since 2011. The department has been awarded star status by DBT. Department has also completed nine innovation projects out of which one of the project was awarded the Best Innovative Idea award for the year 2014-2015 University of Delhi. National and international conferences were organized (November 2016 and March 2018) to make participants aware about new scientific developments and to provide opportunities to connect with other attendees from different perspectives and views. Faculty development programmes (June 2017) are organized to benefit the faculty members of different colleges to attain new knowledge, diverse skills and abilities to integrate technology into teaching, learning and research activities. 2AM CO **DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMICS**

Economics Department of Daulat Ram College was established in 1960. The Department offers a complete B.A. (Hons) Economics undergraduate three year program, along with various interdisciplinary courses like Principles of Microeconomics, Principles of Macroeconomics, Economic Development and Policy in India, International Trade, Understanding Economic Survey and Union Budget, Indian Economy and, Money and Banking, for students of other Departments. Economics (Hons) students also participate in courses offered by other departments, for e.g. Linear Algebra, Calculus, Formal Logic, Skill Enhancement Credit Course (SECC), Ability Enhancement Credit Course (AECC). The cut off for admissions to the department for the last 5 years has been in the range of 95%-97%. The pass percentage of our students has been 95% with nearly 65% scoring 1st divisions.

The Department of Economics has been one of the most proactive, innovative and hardworking departments in the college. The strength of the department lies in the extraordinary result of the students and the fact that they are geared up and prepared for other spheres of life like community service and skill development hand in hand with academics. It is this relationship between words and life that literature attempts to explore. An Honours course in English Literature teaches the students to engage with a whole range of literary texts spanning across different countries and time periods, including diverse genres and categories. Canonical



texts co exist with popular fiction and cinema. Students are taught to read not just the surface texts but also the subtexts and silences, and are sensitized to the existence of multiple contexts and realities. In addition to the sheer joy of reading, this course prepares students for a career in academics, teaching, creative writing, mass communication, journalism, editing and publishing, civil services, theatre, career counseling, to name a few.

"Literati" - the English Literary Society is a vibrant and active society which regularly conducts workshops and invites eminent resource persons to address and interact with the students. The weekly Study Circle involves students in paper presentations, panel discussions and other interactive sessions. The Department of English believes in an interdisciplinary pedagogical approach and encourages the students to step out of the classroom and engage with literary texts as performances, book readings, film screenings and talks. Interacting with authors, scholars, critics, theatre personnel and performance artists, proves to be a very enriching experience for the students, as literature too, comes alive for them in the process. The Department holds an annual Literary Festival and releases its magazine, *Expressions*, comprising students' contributions. In April 2018, the Department released the first ever digital version of its magazine. In addition, the Department conducts regular tutorials for M.A. students of the Previous and Final years, starting with an Orientation session.

हिन्दी अंतर्राष्ट्रीय पटल पर अपनी पहचान बना चुकी है। यह ग्लोबल भाषा बन चुकी है नित-नृतन हिन्दी 'भाखा बहता नीर है।' हिन्दी की लिपि देवनागरी है जो कि वैज्ञानिक लिपि भी मानी जाती है। ज्ञान-विज्ञान की दौर में इस देवनागरी लिपि ने अपना समुचित विकास किया है। देवनागरी लिपि के विकास से मानवीय सभ्यता की शुरूआत होती है, संस्कृति और परम्पराओं की वो गाथा जो आज जुड़ती है-एक ऐसी भाषा से विश्व मानचित्र पर हिंदी भाषा के रूप में जाना गया है। हिंदी ऐसी भाषा है जो लिपि को समझने की एक दृष्टि विकसित करती है। भारतीय इतिहास के अनसुलझे पृष्ठों की गहराईयों तक हिन्दी जाकर पैठती है। इसके अन्दर कविताओं का सौन्दर्य, कहानियों का यथार्थ और आदर्श, नाटकों के मंचन से समाज को चुनौती देने का साहस समाहित है। इसके अतिरिक्त वैदिक साहित्य से आरम्भ होते हुए हिन्दी भाषा एवं साहित्य वर्तमान दौर के विमर्शों स्त्री विमर्श, दलित विमर्श, आदिवासी विमर्श, अल्पसंख्यक विमर्श, ट्रान्सजेण्डर इत्यादि अस्मितामूलक विमर्श को केन्द्र में लाने का प्रयास करती है। यह शोध की नई संभावनाओं के विकास का मार्ग भी खोलती है। भारतीय अपित पश्चिम के साहित्य, सिद्धान्त, अवधाारणाएँ और वैचारिकताएँ भी पाठ्यक्रम का महत्त्वपूर्ण अंश है जो बदलते परिवेश के संघर्षों यथार्थ और स्वरूप पर विचार करने के लिए प्रेरित करते हैं। हिन्दी स्नातक के लिए स्नातकोत्तर अध्ययन, भाषा-शिक्षण, मीडिया (टी.वी., रेडियो) अनुवाद, रंगमंच, विज्ञापन आदि हिन्दी भाषा के विविध कार्यक्षेत्र खुले हैं। हिंदी का स्नातक देश की सबसे बड़ी सेवा प्रशासनिक सेवा (सिविल सर्विसेज) की परीक्षा दे सकते हैं और शोधकार्य कर सकता है। इसके साथ ही अनुवाद के क्षेत्र में भी वह अपनी मुख्य पहचान बना सकता है। हिंदी विभाग, हिन्दी विशेष और बी.ए., बी.कॉम. प्रोग्राम से सम्बंधित पाठ्यक्रम प्रस्तावित करता है। हिन्दी विशेष के तीन वर्षीय पाठ्यक्रम में भाषा, साहित्य, समाज, संस्कृति के विविध पक्षों की जानकारी दी जाती है। बी.ए. प्रोग्राम हिन्दी अनिवार्य, मुख्य तथा वैकल्पिक विषय के रूप में पढाई जाती है। अन्य विषयों में यह जैनेरिक, हिन्दी कौशल संवर्द्धक और एम.आई.एल. कम्युनिकेशन के रूप में पढाई जाती है।

The department of History was set up in the year 1960, when the discipline was offered in the B.A. Programme course. Subsequently, it was upgraded as a fully fledged Honours course. Today the department also offers many interdisciplinary papers to students from other departments in the form of general elective and skill enhancement courses. The syllabus offered by the department covers both Indian and World History from antiquity to the contemporary period. The department has dedicated and qualified professors, with a variety of research and teaching specialization. The teaching methodology is interdisciplinary with a hands-on approach, with emphasis on interactive classes, group discussions, field trips and movie screenings. Students are encouraged to go beyond the textbooks for completing their projects and assignments. Audio-visual media is used during the lectures and tutorial classes. 

Relevant University Ordinances

19.1 ORDINANCE XV-B

Maintenance of discipline among Students of the University

- 1. All powers relating to discipline and disciplinary action are vested in the Vice Chancellor.
- 2. The Vice-Chancellor may delegate all or such powers as he / she deems proper to the Proctor and to such other persons as he/she may specify in this behalf.
- 3. Without prejudice to the generality of power to enforce discipline under the Ordinance the following shall amount to acts of gross indiscipline:
 - a. Physical assault, or threat to use physical force, against any member of the teaching and nonteaching staff of any Institution / Department and against any student within the University of Delhi
 - b. Carrying of, use of or threat to use of any weapons
 - c. Any violation of the provisions of the Civil Rights Protection Act, 1976
 - d. Violation of the status, dignity and honour of students belonging to the scheduled castes and tribes
 - e. Any practice-whether verbal or otherwise-derogatory of women
 - f. Any attempt at bribing or corruption in any manner
 - g. Willful destruction of institutional property
 - h. Creating ill-will or intolerance on religious or communal grounds
 - i. Causing disruption in any manner of the academic functioning of the University system;
 - j. Prohibition of Ragging as per Ordinance XV-C.
- 4. Without prejudice to the generality of his / her powers relating to the maintenance of discipline and taking such action in the interest of maintaining discipline as may seem to him/her appropriate, the Vice-Chancellor, may in the exercise of his / her powers aforesaid order or direct that any student or students
 - a. be expelled; or
 - b. be, for a stated period rusticated; or
 - c. be not for a stated period, admitted to a programme or programmes of study in a College, Department or Institution of the University; or
 - d. be fined with a sum of rupees that may be specified; or
 - e. be debarred from taking a University or College or Departmental Examination or Examinations for one or more years; or that the result of the student or students concerned in the Examination or Examinations in which he/she or they have appeared be cancelled.
- 5. Institutions, Halls and teaching in the concerned Departments. They may exercise their authority through, or delegate authority to such of the teachers in their Colleges, Institutions or Departments as they may specify for these purposes.
- 6. Without prejudice to the powers of the Vice-Chancellor and the Proctor as aforesaid, detailed rules of discipline and proper conduct shall be framed. These rules may be supplemented, where necessary,



by the Principals of Colleges, Heads of Halls, Deans of Faculties and Heads of Teaching Departments in this University. Each student shall be expected to provide himself / herself with a copy of these rules. At the time of admission, every student shall be required to sign a declaration that on admission he /she submits himself / herself to the disciplinary jurisdiction of the Vice-Chancellor and several authorities of the University who may be vested with the authority to exercise discipline under the Acts, the Statutes, the Ordinances and the rules that have been framed therein by the University.

19.2 ORDINANCE XV-C

Prohibition and Punishment for Ragging

- 1. Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited, within the premises of College / Department or Institution and any part of Delhi University system as well as on public transport.
- 2. Any individual or collective act or practice of ragging constitutes gross indiscipline and shall be dealt with under this Ordinance.
- 3. Ragging for the purposes of this Ordinance, ordinarily means any act, conduct or practice by which dominant power or status of senior students is brought to bear on students freshly enrolled or students who are in any way considered junior or inferior by other students; and includes individual or collective acts or practices which
 - a. Involve physical assault or threat to use of physical force.
 - b. Violate the status, dignity and honour of women students.
 - c. Violate the status, dignity and honour of students belonging to the scheduled caste and tribe.
 - d. Expose students to ridicule and contempt and affect their self-esteem.
 - e. Entail verbal abuse and aggression, indecent gestures and obscene behaviour.
- 4. The Principal of a College, the Head of the Department or an Institution, the authorities of College, or University Hostel or Halls of Residence shall take immediate action on any information of the occurrence of ragging.
- 5. Notwithstanding anything in Clause (4) above, the Proctor may also suomoto enquire into any incident of ragging and make a report to the Vice-Chancellor of the identity of those who have engaged in ragging and the nature of the incident.
- 6. The Proctor may also submit an initial report establishing the identity of the perpetrators of ragging and the nature of the ragging incident.
- 7. If the Principal of a College or Head of the Department or Institution or the Proctor is satisfied that for some reason, to be recorded in writing, it is not reasonably practical to hold such an enquiry, he/she may so advise the Vice-Chancellor accordingly.
- 8. When the Vice-Chancellor is satisfied that it is not expedient to hold such an enquiry, his/ her decision shall be final.
- 9. On the receipt of a report under Clause (5) or (6) or a determination by the relevant authority under clause (7) disclosing the occurrence of ragging incidents described in Clause 3(a), (b) and (c) the Vice-Chancellor shall direct or order rustication of a student or students for a specific number of years.
- 10. The Vice-chancellor may in other cases of ragging order or direct that any student or students be expelled or be not for a stated period, admitted to a programme of study in a college, departmental



examination for one or more years or that the results of the student or students concerned in the examination or examinations in which they appeared be cancelled.

- 11. In case any students who have obtained degrees or diplomas of the University of Delhi are found guilty; under this Ordinance, appropriate action will be taken under Statute 15 for withdrawal of degrees or diploma conferred by the University.
- 12. For the purpose of this Ordinance, abetment to ragging whether by way of any act, practice or incitement of ragging will also amount to ragging.
- 13. All Institutions within the Delhi University system shall be obligated to carry out instructions /directions issued under this Ordinance, and to give aid assistance to the Vice-Chancellor to achieve the effective implementation of the Ordinance.

Note: Order of the Vice-Chancellor in pursuance of Ordinance XV-C:

Where incident(s) of ragging are reported to the Vice-Chancellor by any authority under this Ordinance, the students(s) involved in ragging, shall be expelled for a specified term, designated in the order. Non-students involved in reports of ragging will be proceeded with under the criminal law of India; they will also be rendered ineligible for a period of five years from seeking enrolment in any of the institutions of the University of Delhi. Students against whom necessary action is taken under this note, will be given post decisional hearing, with strict adherence to the rules of natural justice.

19.3 ORDINANCE XV-D

The Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013 (MINISTRY OF LAW AND JUSTICE)

An Act to provide protection against sexual harassment of women at workplace and for the prevention and redressal of complaints of sexual harassment and for matters connected there with incidental thereto.

WHEREAS sexual harassment results in violation of the fundamental rights of a woman to equality under articles 14 and 15 of the Constitution of India and her right to life and to live with dignity under article 21 of the Constitution and right to practice any profession or to carry on any occupation, trade or business which includes a right to a safe environment free from sexual harassment; AND WHEREAS the protection against sexual harassment and the right to work with dignity are universally recognized human rights by international conventions and instruments such as Convention on the Elimination of all forms of discrimination against Women, which has been ratified on the 25th June, 1993 by the Government of India.

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to make provisions for giving effect to the said Convention for protection of women against sexual harassment at workplace. For details, please see the website http://indiacode.nic.in/acts-in-pdf/142013.pdf.

Note: An applicant can take admission only in one programme in one college at any given time. In case an admitted student wishes to withdraw/cancel the admission in any programme/college, she/he may cancel her/his admission online (cancellation fee will be charged as per the University Cancellation Policy), and approach the college to collect her/his certificates where the admission was taken. The applicant can proceed to take admission in another programme/college. Admission fee will be adjusted automatically and the applicant will need to pay only the balance, if the fee is more in the new college/programme in which the admission is being sought. In case the fee is less in the new college/programme, the balance would be refunded to the applicant's account as per the College/University rules after the admissions are closed.
